In this evening discussion with renowned historian and author Philipp Blom, we set out to explore what Europe as *terra nova* could look like and to discover new pathways for reimagining the continent's future.

In the face of war, climate change and environmental disasters, the rise of authoritarianism, digital threats and a multitude of other crises, many Europeans struggle to imagine a future that is not defined by catastrophe. What impact does the widespread sentiment that there is no common future worth striving for have on European societies – and how can it be prevented from becoming a self-fulfilling prophecy? How can we foster a more constructive outlook on the future of Europe and the European Union? What stories must we tell, and what images must we create, in order to build a common European future? What categories of thinking – and what kind of language – are needed to enable Europe to face new realities?

Together with Philipp Blom, we will explore these questions in an evening of discussion and reflection. In short interventions, artists and researchers from the transdisciplinary project **EU Meets Europe** will share their perspectives – through poems, visual art and thought experiments – offering their viewpoints and ideas on the future of Europe and European integration.
